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Practice 1

Listening Texts

In this listening test, you will listen to a total of seven texts. Each text will be read twice. Listen carefully to the text that is read to you and answer the questions that follow. Write 1, 2 or 3 in the brackets provided. You may attempt the questions at any time during the test.

The test is about to begin.

Text 1

You will hear an announcement about new food in the canteen.

Before you listen to Text 1, read questions 1 and 2 now.

Listen to Text 1 and answer questions 1 and 2.

Good morning, boys and girls. I have good news for you. Remember the canteen survey we started last month? Well, we have studied the findings and made some recommendations. Many of you wanted ice cream and lollies to be sold in the canteen. However, they are not healthy snacks for you as they are not very nutritious, containing mainly sugar and practically nothing else. So, instead of ice cream and lollies, the stall next to the fruit juice stall will be selling fruit smoothies and ice kachang. Fruit smoothies have lots of vitamin C and ice kachang comes with red beans and corn, which is more nutritious than lollies. We have heard your request for cold desserts, especially on hot afternoons and after running about during PE. We hope you will enjoy them. But do not just eat cold desserts during recess. Make sure you have some hot food like noodle soup and chicken rice too.

(a) I like the cover of the textbook for English as I like English. I think it is an interesting subject. I love English poems, songs and storybooks. My English teacher is Mrs Raj. I love this subject very much because I am good at English.

Conversation

(a) Yes, I have seen such recycling bins at the foot of the block of flats where I live. They are placed there so that people will find it convenient to recycle. It is nearby and not too much of a hassle to bring heavy items there. If the place is too far, people may not take the trouble to carry their items there. Newspapers can be heavy in huge bundles, so people may not have the strength to carry them to faraway locations. I think items that are good to recycle are newspapers and bottles. Newspapers can be made into pulp and new paper products after that.

OR

Yes, I have seen such recycling bins in my school canteen and car park. They are placed there so that students will find it convenient to recycle used paper and cans. After eating in the canteen, they can throw their empty food and drink packets into the recycling bins provided the packets are clean. Dirty food and drink packets cannot be recycled unless they are washed and dried. If there are no recycling bins there, students will throw everything in the dustbins instead. It is a good place to encourage recycling. Drink bottles can be recycled easily if they are made of glass. Plastic bottles are not suitable for recycling because the coating from the plastic bottles may release certain chemicals in high temperatures. It is not safe to drink from recycled plastic bottles.

- (b) I recycle my old textbooks at the end of the year by giving them away to a supermarket or to the collection centre at my Community Club. I recycle my used exercise books and workbooks by putting them in recycling bins. I also reuse the plastic bags that shops use to put items in. My mother keeps biscuit tins and containers instead of throwing them away. I think she does this because the containers are in good condition. It is a waste to throw away something that can still be used. She puts all kinds of things in these recycled containers soap, rice, cookies, even costume jewellery. OR
 - I recycle my old clothes and shoes by donating them to the Salvation Army store. I also recycle tetra packets of drinks after finishing them. I recycle my art sketchbook after using it because the paper is thick and hard and good for art and crafts. I use it to make tissue boxes, paper lanterns and other cute stuff that I design and give away as presents to my friends. My mother recycles curtains and bedsheets by making them into something else. Our living room rugs are actually made from old curtains and our quilts from old bedsheets. I think my mother does so because the colours and patterns of our curtains and bedsheets are bright and colourful, and we can't bear to throw them away after buying new ones, so my mother turns them into attractive rugs and quilts.
- (c) We can play a part in saving the Earth in many ways, not just by recycling used things. We can walk instead of using the car so that we do not cause more pollution. We can save water by using it wisely, like not taking long baths but having quick showers. We can save electricity by switching off the lights, fans and appliances when we are not using them. Instead of the air-conditioner, we can use fans to cool the room down. We can bring containers for food instead of getting the sellers to provide plastic or CFC food containers.

OR

There are many different ways to save the Earth besides recycling. The Earth has limited resources. We can cut down on the use of water and electricity. We can use water sparingly, for example, not using the long hose to wash the car or water the garden but using a pail or watering can instead. We can use a basin for washing dishes and clothes so that the water we use is less than when we wash them under a running tap. We can car-pool or take the bus or train instead of driving individual cars to get to a common destination. Even children can help save the Earth by putting their mobile phones on low power mode or energy-saving mode!

Conversation

(a) Yes, the poster has pictures which make it look easy to take steps to prevent the spread of dengue fever. There are simple things we can do, like putting the lid or cover on a container of water, pouring out the water from a vase of flowers to change it and so on. It is easy to turn a pail over so that it does not collect rain water and allow mosquitoes to breed in the water. It is also easy to tilt the tyre in such a way that any water in it can flow out. The steps are not difficult for adults or even children to follow. If the poster shows steps that are difficult, people are not going to make an effort to follow the steps. OR

No, the pictures in the poster do not explain clearly what the steps are. There is a picture of some fish in a container but it is not clear to me what the step is. I think the picture should also have words to tell me what to do. There are some arrows pointing into some containers and some arrows pointing out. While it is clear that we should pour out water in the examples where there are arrows pointing out, it is not clear for the examples with arrows pointing into the water. Do we fill the container with the water? If we do, how does it stop the breeding of mosquitoes?

(b) Some people will heed the advice given because they do not want to get dengue fever. They will throw away water to stop the breeding of mosquitoes. They realise that dengue fever is a serious illness, and old people may die when infected, so for the sake of the elderly members in their family, these people will do their best to take the recommended steps shown in posters.

OR

No, some people do not take the advice seriously. People with gardens may not have the time to check every pot plate or inspect their roofs regularly to remove leaves. If they don't do anything, they think they will not get into trouble. They do not think they will get sick with the dengue virus easily because they are young and strong. Tougher actions like strict laws are needed to make such people listen to advice.

(c) Besides giving advice, we can have laws that will fine people who breed mosquitoes in their homes or gardens. People will act if there are such laws because they don't want to pay fines. We can also put their house or flat numbers on the notice board so that they know their neighbours will find out about their negligent behaviour. They will also feel embarrassed when they are caught doing such irresponsible acts. Advice alone is not enough. I think we need action to stop this mosquito from breeding in large numbers.

OF

Besides giving advice, there should be advertisements on television or YouTube videos to warn people against breeding mosquitoes. The schools can also have assembly talks about dengue fever to teach young children about it, so they can help their family members fight the spread of dengue fever. Science lessons can also teach students about the life cycle of the mosquito, so that students understand more about it and can take effective action against its breeding. Checks can be conducted, and those who are found breeding mosquitoes can be punished by fines or embarrassing them in public by making them do Public Corrective Order such as sweeping drains and clearing them of leaves.

When the owners go for holidays, they also need to plan how to make sure their pets still get food and water in their absence. They can leave them with relatives and friends. They cannot just abandon them and go for their holiday.

OR

Not really, I think punishing pet abusers will not help solve the problem. It is better to teach them about responsibility. Paying a fine is not a serious punishment, and the abusers will not change for the better. I think the abuser should go for compulsory lessons on responsible pet care and be observed for a while to ensure that they have learnt from their mistake of pet abuse. In this way, hopefully, there will be fewer repeat pet abusers.
